

Clinical Assistant or Associate Professor Position at Kent State University

The Department of Psychology at Kent State University seeks a Clinical Assistant/Associate Professor (non-tenure track) to serve as the Director of our in-house training clinic. This year-round position is slated to begin **June 1, 2012**. The mission of the Psychological Clinic is to provide resources that are necessary for doctoral student professional training, serving a campus and community population, and facilitate research. In keeping with this mission, we are seeking a qualified psychologist to serve as the Director of the Psychological Clinic and to participate in clinical training and supervision of clinical psychology doctoral students. The Director will also serve as liaison with community agencies that provide field placement opportunities for students and coordinator of the field placements. This individual must have prior clinical experience with empirically supported practices and a commitment to the clinical-scientist model of professional training. Licensure or license eligibility as a Psychologist in the State of Ohio and is required. Review of applications will begin on March 15 and will continue until the position has been filled.
