# Kent State University Master of Science/Dietetic Internship Program

The Kent State University Master of Science/Dietetic Internship program is housed under the College of Education, Health, and Human Services and is offered by the Department of Nutrition and Dietetics in the School of Health Sciences.

### Mission

The Kent State University's Master of Science in Nutrition/Dietetic Internship Program is dedicated to providing advanced professional education, broadening intellectual perspectives, and promoting ethical professional practice based on humanitarian values. At Kent State University, a major focus is to foster a learning environment where students and interns are taught to respond to social, cultural, intellectual, and technological challenges. In addition, emphasis is placed on the development of skills for continuing professional development and enhanced ability, including leadership, to respond to the versatile demands of the dietetics profession.

The program at Kent State University is designed to prepare dietetic interns to become entrylevel Registered Dietitian Nutritionists (RDN) with the added strength of a Master of Science in Nutrition. Throughout the 21-month program, interns will be provided with a professional and academic environment in which to develop the skills needed to become competent in the areas of nutrition therapy, community dietetics, management, business, and leadership.

### Kent State University Master of Science/Dietetic Internship Program Program Goals and Measurable Objectives

#### **Program Goal 1: To prepare program graduates to practice as competent entry-level Registered Dietitian Nutritionists (RDN).**

### Program Goal 1 Objectives:

- At least 80% of program interns complete program/degree requirements within 31months.
- Of graduates who seek employment, 80% are employed in nutrition and dietetics or related fields within 12 months of graduation.
- 80% of program graduates take the CDR credentialing exam for dietitian nutritionists within 12 months of program completion.
- The program's one-year pass rate (graduates who pass the registration exam within one year of first attempt) on the CDR credentialing exam for dietitian nutritionists is at least 80%.
- At least 80% of responding employers will rate graduates as competent (i.e. a score of 3 or > on a scale of 1-5) for entry-level practice when surveyed one-year post graduation.
- At least 80% of responding graduates will rate that they felt prepared (i.e. a score 3 or > on a 1-5 scale) when surveyed one-year post graduation.

#### Program Goal 2: To develop program graduates to be entry-level Registered Dietitian Nutritionists (RDN) that utilize their foundation of knowledge and skills in leadership.

### Program Goal 2 Objectives:

- At least 80% of interns will identify an increased knowledge base of leadership (using a YES/NO scale) during the internship when surveyed using the End Internship Program Evaluation.
- At least 80% of interns will affirm (using a YES/NO scale) that they have utilized their leadership knowledge (that they obtained during the internship) in one or more professional settings during the internship when surveyed using the End Internship Program Evaluation.
- At least 80% of responding graduates will affirm (using a YES/NO scale) that they have utilized their leadership knowledge (that they obtained during the internship) in one or more professional settings post internship when surveyed one-year post graduation.
- At least 80% of responding employers will rate 3 or > in response to graduates exhibiting leadership skills in the practice setting when surveyed one-year post graduation.

## Kent State University Master of Science/Dietetic Internship Program Requirements and Schedule

The following outline represents the schedule and sequence of classes leading to a Master of Science in Nutrition and Dietetics and completion of the requirements for the Dietetic Internship. Please refer to the Nutrition & Dietetics Graduate Handbook and the Kent State University Graduate Schools Catalog for additional information such as course descriptions and graduation requirements. Refer to the Kent State University Schedule of Classes for course registration information for each semester.

# **Program Requirements**

The Kent State University Master of Science in Nutrition/Dietetic Internship Program is completed in 43 credit hours. The program is usually finished in 4 semesters and one summer semester. The Kent State University Master of Science/Dietetic Internship Program follows the Kent State University Academic Calendar which can be found at <a href="https://www.kent.edu/academic-calendar">https://www.kent.edu/academic-calendar</a> The supervised practice component of the program must be completed within 31 months of the start of the program; exceptions to this requirement must be approved by the internship faculty.

Upon completion of the 21-month program and all degree requirements, graduates will receive a Dietetic Internship Verification Statement, documenting completion of the internship requirements and will be eligible to take the CDR Credentialing exam for dietitian nutritionists. In addition, program graduates will have completed the requirements for the Master of Science degree and will receive a Master of Science from Kent State University.

# Assessment of Prior Learning and Credit Toward Program Requirements:

The Combined KSU/Dietetic Internship Program does not award credit from previous experience(s) toward the total hours required for the internship.

# **Remote/Virtual Supervised Practice Experience Requirements:**

Interns placed in supervised practice experiences that are virtual will be required to have a minimum of a personal laptop and internet access. The Dietetic Internship Program Director will work with the virtual rotation site to determine specific intern requirements for the experience. The Dietetic Internship Program Director will also ascertain that the intern meets the requirements needed prior to placing them in a remote experience. Onsite placements will be available for interns who do not meet the requirements for a virtual experience.

All online testing is conducted using the Canvas learning system through Kent State which necessitates a user name/password for intern identity verification.

### **KSU Dietetic Internship Supervised Practice Experiences**

#### Food Service Management – 288 Total Hours

Food Service Management is completed in 288 hours. The experiences are completed over 12 weeks during the academic semesters by working 24 hours per week.

The Food Service Management experiences include the following:

Hospital Food Service Management	216 hours (9 weeks)
School Food Service Management	72 hours (3 weeks)

#### **Clinical Nutrition Management - 80 Total Hours (10 days)**

Clinical Nutrition Management rotations are completed in 80 hours during the academic semesters by working 8 hours per day for 10 days. The Clinical Nutrition Management experience is usually completed in the hospital setting.

#### **Community – 288 Total Hours**

Community rotations are completed in 288 hours during the academic semesters. Interns work for 24 hours per week for 12 weeks.

The required Community experiences include the following:

Outpatient Nutrition Clinic/WIC96 hours (4 weeks)Dialysis Center120 hours (5 weeks)School Nutrition Education72 hours (3 weeks)

#### **Clinical Nutrition Therapy - 576 Total Hours**

Clinical Nutrition Therapy rotations are completed in 576 hours during the academic semesters and during the summer. During one summer, interns work full-time at a major medical center for 12 weeks (480 hours) and complete Pediatrics, Medicine, Surgery, Critical Care, and Geriatric supervised practice experiences.

Clinical dietetic rotations in Long Term Care facilities are completed in 96 hours during the academic semesters. The intern works 24 hours per week for 4 weeks at a long term care facility.

#### **Business - 120 Total Hours**

Business experiences include 120 hours during the academic semesters. The intern works 24 hours per week for 5 weeks in business supervised practice experiences.

The Business experience will include sales, marketing, food distribution, food delivery services, and/or other aspects of the business sector as appropriate for the organization.

#### **Electives - 144 Total Hours**

Interns select 144 hours (6 weeks) during the academic semester to complete elective rotations.

#### **Thesis/Masters Project**

Students can select a Thesis or a Master Project Option.

A total of 6 credits must be taken for either the Thesis or Master Project option. These credits can be taken one semester or divided into two semesters. Interns need to be careful to meet the deadlines for requirements of either option that are provided by the College of Education, Health, and Human Services, so they can graduate on time. Interns should communicate questions and progress toward program completion with their advisor.

\*The Thesis option is intended to provide students with the opportunity to conduct original research. Approval of a thesis proposal by the student's thesis committee is required, as is the successful completion of an oral examination conducted by the thesis committee. If the intern has completed a total of 6 credits of Thesis I, the intern will be required to sign up every semester until graduating for NUTR 63299 Thesis II.

\*\*The Masters Project Option is intended for students approaching research in a more applied manner. For this option, approval of the intended project by the student's Masters Project committee is required, as is the successful completion of an oral final examination conducted by the committee.
