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Dr. Deborah Adair Executive Director, Quality Matters

Dr. Adair is the Executive Director of Quality Matters, a widely-adopted international non-profit organization for quality assurance in online learning serving approximately 1,100 colleges and universities, education-related organizations, government entities, and K-12 institutions. Dr. Adair has held faculty appointments in management at several universities and has more than 25 years' experience in higher education, in teaching and administration, as well as non-profit leadership and management consulting. Her acknowledgments include citations from state and local governments for her work on literacy and women's issues, the Broward College Alumni Merit Award, and the Nofflet Williams Award for service to the distance learning community.

She currently serves on advisory boards for the National University Technology Network, the Presidents' Forum, and Credential Engine. She previously served on the advisory board for the WICHE Cooperative for Educational Technologies. As an expert in quality assurance for online education, Dr. Adair is a frequent keynote speaker, presenter, and author.

Engage Your Students with Assignments that Create Open, Accessible, Interactive Learning Resources

During the first part of this session, you'll learn how to find open source learning resources that are accessible and meet your learning objectives. We'll examine ways that students can create accessible content for other students. In the second part of this session, we'll look at a free, open source technology to create interactive learning resources. You can use this H5P technology to create OER for your students and engage your students with creation of OER for one another. You'll learn where you can download open source technology to self-host, and where you can create a free account to create the resources. You'll see how the content can be embedded in Blackboard Learn's HTML editor, as well as Pressbooks.



Integrating Publisher Materials to Support General Standards 4 and 5

Publisher platforms can offer a variety of instructional materials and course activities to help students meet course learning outcomes. However, just providing students with a link to the publisher materials does not equal a quality online course. In working with two Accounting faculty, the instructional designer created an enhanced organization to integrate publisher materials to support General Standards 4 and 5 within the learning management system. During the presentation, both the faculty members and the instructional designer will share their experiences.

Putting the Pieces Together: Implementing and Sustaining OM

In this presentation, instructional designers from Cleveland State University's Center for eLearning will share a multifaceted approach for implementing and sustaining Quality Matters at this public university. In an environment where there are no mandates on faculty, the Center for eLearning has had to gain momentum for implementing Quality Matters by a variety of means. The Center has found that creating a multi-faceted approach has helped to provide a QM framework within which faculty gain an increased awareness of, and buy-in for, the value of QM Design Standards. The approach is comprised of multiple tools, processes, professional development and challenges that the presenters will share.

Designing Quality Master Courses

In this session, two presenters from different institutions will present their perspective on designing a "Master Course". One will be a more case-based approach centered on collaborative faculty involvement in meeting General Standard 3, and the other will be a more institution-wide perspective on creating Master Courses at scale, including design considerations and delivery opportunities. This session will also touch on QM's Multi-Section Policy, which deals with QM Reviews for master courses.

How do you design an online course for a culturally diverse student population? In this session, we will talk about the cultural perspectives that we should pay attention to when designing an online course. Then, we will promote three design frameworks that can assist with cultural diversity including QM Higher Education Rubric, Universal Design for Learning, and Integrated Multicultural Design. We will promote culturally responsive instructional design in online courses by discussing the overlapping themes in the frameworks and sharing an application of these frameworks. Finally, we will present some best practices in the development of an International Online Orientation.

The ABCs of CBE Course Design

Recognized as a CBE best practice model for Ohio (ODHE 2016 Annual Report), Sinclair Community College received full HLC institutional accreditation for its current and future CBE programs in 2017. But how did we get to this level? This session focuses on three core elements of Sinclair's CBE course design: Alignment, Branding, and Course framework. Additionally, participants will see examples of how faculty and IDs can use storyboarding to assist in CBE course design. From Ordinary to Extraordinary: How Student Engagement Can Redefine your Course and Facilitate Deeper Student Learning

This session is for anyone, IDs or faculty developer, who wants to learn how to transform an ordinary run-of-mill course into an extraordinary engaging one by changing how the students interact with each other, the content, and the instructor. The importance of a QM champion and task force will be stressed.
