Student Belonging Project

The Student Belonging Project has allowed your strategies to improve students' sense of belonging to help others at KSU. Shown below are 5 straight-forward strategies that you can consider adopting for your next class session.

Beginning of semester strategies for student belonging:

- Learn about your students, including names (with pronunciation), pronouns, interests.
- Explain your pedagogical rationale for each element of the syllabus, (i.e. why do you have certain rules, assignments, grading criteria).
- Support students in forming study groups. You might help them in finding others who study at similar times and identify ways they can connect.
- Provide time for either a 5-minute warm-up or wind-down for checking in, recalling information, collaborating with each other.
- Don't forget to claim your inviting office hour sign for your door--this helps students feel that they belong located on the CTL website. [Student Belonging Resources](#)

Spring/Summer Faculty Anti-Bias Workshop Series

Kent State University is committed to being a diverse, inclusive and equitable place for all who live, work and study here. In order to support this commitment, a workshop series has been organized for faculty by the Center for Teaching and Learning (CTL) and the Division of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI). All full-time Faculty are eligible to apply to participate with a maximum enrollment of 100 participants. Community members in this workshop series are expected to participate, to be fully engaged, and to be open to learning about the ongoing oppression that individuals with marginalized and/or underrepresented identities experience. Faculty who are accepted must attend one of each of the 5 sessions and must satisfactorily complete all required reflections for each session by August 1, 2022 to receive a stipend of \$1,000. All synchronous sessions will be held virtually. Session topics, dates and times are in the application. Applications are due by **January 31, 2022**. The Spark of Learning: Energizing College Classroom with the Science of Emotion by Sarah Rose Cavanagh, 2016, West Virginia University Press, 1st Edition.

In her book, *The Spark of Learning*, Sarah Rose Cavanagh seeks to enhance student motivation and learning. Through practical recommendations for teaching in the classroom to connections with neuroscientific research on the brain, she posits that if

you as an educator want to capture your students' attention, harness their working memory, bolster their long-term retention, and enhance their motivation, you should consider the emotional impact of your teaching style and course design. She brings to bear a wide range of evidence from the study of education, psychology, and neuroscience, and she provides practical examples of successful classroom activities from a variety of disciplines in secondary and higher education. Summer Teaching Development Grant Applications

The University Teaching Council's Summer Teaching Development Grant is intended to enhance student learning by engaging faculty to significantly improve teaching methods, develop curricula, or create innovative course materials. The project needs to exceed normal course preparation, and it should either improve current pedagogical practices or introduce new pedagogical methods or materials that will significantly improve teaching and enhance student learning beyond a single course or single faculty member. The University Teaching Council has raised the reporting expectation for this grant. Awarded faculty are required to present at the 2022 UTC Celebrating College Teaching Conference on October 21st and submit a Final Grant Summary Report that will minimally include:

- The completed activities during the grant period.
- The measured or anticipated effect of the project in terms of student learning at Kent State.
- The public/peer review of their findings (or the plan for this public/peer review).

A portion of the final award for ten weeks (\$1,000.00) or five weeks (\$500.00) will be withheld until the University Teaching Council has reviewed and accepted the report.

Grant Money for Affordable Course Materials

OhioLINK's newest textbook affordability grant focuses on course redesign. Six to eight full or part-time faculty instructors will be selected to receive a \$600 stipend. An OhioLINK OER Librarian will review selected instructors' syllabi topics, mapping them to quality affordable content, including Open Access resources and content licensed by libraries, saving instructors' time with identification, selection, and evaluation. In addition to participating in training,

successful awardees will present at the Ohio OpenCon conference in Spring 2022 or at a future OhioLINK open textbook workshop.

The deadline for application is **Friday, January 28, 2022.**
