1. Describe how the course provides opportunities for students:

- The Educational Studies internship is specifically designed to connect ideas, concepts, and skills developed at the university with their applications to new and different contexts. Students contract with an external agency that will allow them to use course concepts in a practical setting. As an example, students interested in working in a museum, may choose to do internship hours with the McKinley Museum. Their experience would most likely encompass a variety of experiences giving the student the opportunity to learn whether or not this career path meets with their educational and career objectives.
- The Educational Studies Internship definitively broadens the student's understanding of the discipline, the world, or themselves as learners. By being placed in an environment external to the classroom, students will experience the application of theory learned in the classroom.
- By having contact with professionals in the field, students will have the ability to relate their experience with their current academic programs. Part of the internship involves discussion with supervisors and peers in the field. These interactions should allow students the opportunity to reflect upon their current academic plan and their future career goals.

2. Explain how the three learning outcomes will be assessed:

- Students are required to keep a biweekly log that will allow them to connect ideas, concepts, and skills developed at the university with their applications to new and different contexts.
- In the biweekly log, students explain how this experience has broadened their understanding of the discipline, the world, or themselves as learners and reflect on the meaning of the experience for their current and future learning.
- 3. In what ways will your unit communicate expectations described in this proposal to faculty who will be teaching this course? The program coordinator will meet with any new instructor to go over the syllabus and expectations for the course.

In what ways will your unit maintain standards across multiple sections and over time as instructors change? Instructors will use the same syllabus and therefore use the same evaluation criteria in each class.

CHDS 41892 Internship in Educational Studies Syllabus

Required Text: No Text for this class

Objectives/Purpose: The purpose of the practicum is to provide students opportunities to gain practical experience in their area of interest. It is a senior level experience designed to provide students with applied knowledge about an education, health, or human service agency. Ideally, students should have the opportunity to observe, assist and then perform activities and tasks independently with guidance from a mentor/supervisor. Throughout the course of the practicum students will reflect upon what experiences students have had and how these experiences interrelate with course concepts students have learned.

PRACTICUM REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Each student must participate in a minimum of 300 hours of practicum experience in an approved setting. Hours include orientation as well as direct participant contact. These hours are to be recorded on the "Final Evaluation" form which is submitted at the conclusion of the practicum.
- 2. Step 1: Select an approved site and complete "Internship Agreement" and "Assignment of Supervisor" forms (must be signed by the agency supervisor, student and instructor.)
 - Step 2: Turn in both forms to the instructor on record.
 - Step 3: Your forms will be processed and you will be registered for the course if all paperwork is completed properly.
 - Step 4: Submit completed Biweekly Internship Activity Report and Log to instructor every other week throughout the internship experience.
 - Step 5: Half-way through your hours, contact the instructor to schedule a site visit. Also have the agency supervisor complete and submit the Mid-semester Internship Performance Evaluation and Checklist.
 - Step 6: At the completion of the experience, the agency Final Evaluation form, the student Internship Assessment of the Internship form, and Internship Completion form must be turned in. The results of these forms will be considered in the student's overall grade.

Projects:

- 1. Agency (mid-semester) Written evaluation describing the students experience with the agency. Be sure to include positives and negatives from the experience as well as recommendation for a better experience.
- 2. Student (semester) Written log of experiences every other week to include dates, times, activities, and reflections.
- 3. Agency & Student (end of internship) Written evaluation describing the students experience during the internship. Be sure to include the positives and negatives of the experience.

Grading:

Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory – Must complete all aspects of the course to receive a satisfactory grade. Any missing items will result in failing the course.

- 1. <u>Attendance</u>: This course requires students to complete all contact hours at the site. If contact hours are not met, it may result in a reduction in your grade. Participation in the activities and demonstration of the skills presented in this course is required.
- 2. <u>Affective</u>: The affective portion of your performance is related to attendance, punctuality, participation in class discussion and activity, completing the required hours, having appropriate materials and dress, or other behaviors that indicate your level of commitment.
