Proposal Summary

Explain the purpose for this proposal:

This proposal is to formally adapt a previously offered special topics course. As of Fall of 2009, the establishment of casinos in the state of Ohio is now legalized. Casinos are an integral segment of the Hospitality industry, and will seek qualified employees to work and manage operations and people involved in the casino industry. This course has been offered as a Special Topics-Hospitality Management course for the past 3 Spring semesters. The class has filled to capacity indicating strong demand for subject. Establishing this course as a professional elective offers the student a more diverse opportunity to study withinthe formal Hospiality Management curriculum.

Explain how this proposal affects program requirements and students in your unit:

Each student of Hospitality Management is required to enroll in 9-12 credits of 'professional electives', where the student can seek focus in a specific area within the hospiality industry. This course offers another professional elective option for Hospitality Management students. This addition will not affect required hours for program requirements.

Explain how this proposal affects courses, program requirements and student in other units:

The course is open to all majors as a general elective.

Explain how this proposal affects enrollment and staffing:

Since this has historically been offered as a Special Topics course, no additional faculty or staff is required.

Hospitality Management faculty are in the process of completing paperwork to convert a special topics course offered the past three years (HM 41095 Casino Management and Gaming Operations) to a permanent course (HM 33777 Casino Management and Gaming Operations). In this course, students will study casino operations and will travel to casino operations for tours and lectures by managers of these operations. The instructors of this course have been, and are anticipated to continue to be Rob Heiman and Nicholas Bellino. Mr. Bellino has a MS in Hospitality Management and has worked in casino hotel properties. His thesis research focused on responsible gaming. Rob Heiman has a MBA and was the original developer of this course.

The course data sheet is included. Please note that the course content includes a topic on "sports betting." While this is not a significant component of the class, we recognize that you need to be aware that this content is included within the course. Representatives at the School of Foundations, Leadership, and Administration committee brought this oversight to our attention. Our apologies for not taking notice of this issue sooner.

Because this course is part of a larger proposal to create the Hospitality Management program as an independent Bachelor of Science degree program, your very fast response to this request will be much appreciated so that this proposal may be reviewed at the upcoming College Curriculum Committee.

Course Description for HM 37777:

An introduction and orientation into the various aspects of the casino and gaming industry. Students will study the structure of casino organizations, gain basic understanding of gaming operations and responsible gaming. Casino environments will be experienced through on-site visitations. Fund for travel are the student's responsibility, and all students must be legal age of 21 to enroll.
