## **COURSEWORK NOTATION**

The following pages of this Plan of Study reflect doctoral requirements for individuals with no previous graduate training in school psychology and those who have completed graduate coursework in school psychology prior to admission into the Ph.D. program.

Students without Previous Graduate Coursework/Training: Students who entered the program without previous graduate coursework/training in school psychology must first complete the foundational coursework reflected on page 2 of this Plan of Study. As such, the academic advisor, along with the student, must approve of the student's individualized doctoral program during the first semester after conferral of the Master's degree.

<u>Students with Previous Graduate Coursework/Training:</u> It is expected that individuals who have completed <u>recent</u> training in school psychology will demonstrate that they have fulfilled foundational coursework from an approved training program. Such coursework will be reviewed and verified by the student's advisor during the first or second academic semester in program.

## **COMPREHENSIVE EXAMINATION NOTATION**

To apply for the Comprehensive Examination, the academic advisor, along with the student, first must approve that all foundational coursework (reflected on pages 2 and 3 of this Plan of Study) have been completed. Upon successful completion of required coursework, the student will form the Comprehensive Examination Committee. The Comprehensive Examination Committee consists of a primary faculty advisor within the School Psychology Program area, a second faculty member in the School Psychology Program, and a faculty member outside the student's program area. This committee is responsible for facilitating the Comprehensive Examination phase of training. Students should obtain the *Comprehensive Examination Application Packet*, available from the Office of Graduate Student Services, College of Education, Health, and Human Services, for specific application instructions. The School Psychology program permits only Formats 1 and 2 as applicable Comprehensive Examination options (see below):

**FORMAT 1:** The student completes a written major comprehensive examination of approximately 8 hours in length. The examination normally will be written in 4-hour sessions on two consecutive days. No outside resources may be used.

**FORMAT 2:** The student answers four comprehensive questions in the major area of study. Students may take two weeks to complete each question for a total of eight weeks to complete all four. All available resources should be used (e.g., research articles, literature, texts) to answer the questions fully with meaningful and appropriate citations.

**Note:** Different faculty members may prefer one option to another. Please be sure to discuss the options with your Comprehensive Exam Committee and/or Dissertation Committee prior to making a selection above.
