Course Description

This course introduces students to basic NCAA compliance principles and the NCAA rules that affect the administration of a college athletic department. This course offers an understanding of the structure and function of a Division I compliance operation and explores compliance at the Divisions II & III level. The governing principles of institutional control and ethical conduct will be explored from a compliance perspective.

Course Objectives

As a result of this course, students will:

- 1. Gain an understanding of the history, purpose, fundamental policies and administrative organization of the NCAA
- 2. Learn to apply NCAA rules and regulations to compliance-related scenarios
- 3. Learn the basic principles of institutional control for an intercollegiate athletics program and the basic components and applications of an institutional compliance program
- 4. Gain an understanding of the relationship between the NCAA and member institutions
- 5. Gain an understanding of the NCAA legislative process
- 6. Gain an understanding of "right vs. right" ethical dilemmas; learn how to make tough choices through energetic self reflection and an understanding of complex issues
- 7. Gain a basic understanding of how to read and interpret NCAA bylaws

Learning Outcomes

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of how the NCAA governance structure is composed.
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of multi-constituent outcomes in NCAA compliance scenarios.
- 3. Demonstrate competence in interpretive reviews.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of NCAA manual structure and function.
- 5. Demonstrate knowledge and ability to make administratively sound decisions related to NCAA compliance.

Required Text

NCAA 2014-2015 Division I Manual: Constitution, operating bylaws, administrative bylaws.

Attendance

Class attendance is **mandatory**. Students are only excused from class if they present documentation from a legitimate source **prior** to the absence. Unexcused absences, tardiness, or disturbances to the classroom setting will not be tolerated and will result in lowering of the final course grade.

Assignments

Learning Activity's 1-14: There will be a series of learning activities posted on blackboard based on that weeks lecture. Students are expected to post an original response to each activity posted. Grading for this assignment will be influenced by the following: understanding and analysis of the bylaws, understanding of course materials.

Attendance/Group Discussion- To be discussed in class.

Tests-There will be one test in this class – midterm and final exam. Test questions will come from assigned readings, class discussions, and guest speakers.

Paper/Presentation - In groups, students will interview a compliance staff member from any Division of an NCAA compliance program, write a three-page paper and present an oral presentation on their findings. The goal of the project is for the student to gain additional information about day to day compliance duties and the profession as a whole. Additional information and criteria will be distributed in class at a later date.

Final Exam- Test questions will come from assigned readings, class discussions, and guest speakers.

Doctoral Student Assignment

Doctoral students in the course will be required to complete an extra assignment. For this assignment, the doctoral student will be required to choose an NCAA bylaw to present/teach to the class. This will occur toward the end of the semester to allow for the doctoral student to research and gather relevant material that will engage the students and provide information that is critical to the compliance profession. A rubric will be provided for this assignment during the second week of class. This assignment will be worth an additional 50 points, which will raise the doctoral student total points to 300.

Exam/Assignment Protocol

If you are absent for an exam, proper documentation must be presented to the instructor to guarantee a make-up exam date and time. The instructor reserves the right to present a make-up exam in another format. Make-up exams must be completed within one week of the originally scheduled exam. Late assignments will not be accepted.

Course Registration
