COAXING/COAXINGS/COAXINGLY

Usually as **coaxing** (out of 9 examples) regardless of part of speech; with the exceptions of **coaxingly** as an adverb (See: OIMSPR-8, ROVTSR10) and, one instance of **coaxings** as a plural noun (See: NSTYR2-0).

AF-MS-03, .p10 Impenetrable to persuasion, **coaxing**, abuse, to soft words and shrill revilings, to desperate beseechings or murderous threats.

AF-TSR03, .p48 Impenetrable to persuasion, **coaxing,** abuse; to soft words and shrill revilings; to desperate beseechings or murderous threats; for Mrs.

VICTPR33, .p318 -- {op"}You are putting it on" she interrupted in her seductive voice with a **coaxing** intonation.

NSTYR2-0, .p115 Distracted between the **coaxings** and menaces of Sotillo and his staff the miserable commander of the steamer kept her moving with as much prudence as they would let him .p116 exercise .

OIMSPR11, .p171 He saw

himself -- an object creature -- ob*ing the orders of that oneeyed abortion, of that being, hardly human, who had been **coaxing** and menacing him in turns.

OIMSPR-8, .p121

-- {op"}Look how he runs away dearest." -- he said **coaxingly.** {op"}Isn't he funny.

ROVTSR10, .p186

She got up suddenly and caressed the thin, half-averted, withered cheek with the tips of her fingers and in a low voice with that marvellous cadence that plucked at one's heart strings, she said **coaxingly:**

{op"}<u>C'etat des songes, ne'est ce pas?</u>" In her immobility the old woman called with all the might of her will for the presence of Peyrol.

ROVTSR-7, .p115 She didn't want much **coaxing.**

SES-MS-1, .p54 Then his eyes wavered, all his expression changed and in a voice unusually gentle almost **coaxing** {op"}May I come in to take the empty cup away sir." {op"}Of course".
