

When Should You Lecture?

To provide foundational information quickly

To convey information that would be dangerous to teach in any other way


To model disciplinary-based thinking

To provide information about how an active learning exercise will be carried out

When students are interested in a topic and have a foundation of knowledge


What Makes a Good Lecture?



Purpose

Why should your learners care?



What value are they getting?



Making purpose clearer as you go. . .

What is the best way to check for student understanding?

- A. Pause, make eye contact, check for attention.
- **B**. Ask open-ended questions of the whole class, including readings if possible.
- **C**. Create a multiple choice question students can vote on.
- **D**. All of the above, in combination or separately, throughout the lecture.

Structure: Introduction

- Today, we will discuss...
- ➤ What do you already know about...
- ➤ What did we learn last class?
- ➤ Start with an activity or story
- ➤ Start with a question pertaining to topic/pose a problem
- > Figure out students' assumptions




Structure: Road Signs

Outline key points Underline Clear conclusion relevance Break it up


Structure: Closing the Learning Loop




- How do you know if students have learned/ understand?


