February: Black History Month


Black history month dates back to Negro History Week in 1925: A week founded by Harvard-trained historian, Carter G. Woodson.

The week first encompassed birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass.

In 1976, the week was expanded to a month as President Gerald Ford encouraged American's to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."

The theme for the 2023 Black History Month is "Black Resistance" in honor of all the African Americans that have resisted all forms of oppression in the United States.

By resisting, Black people have triumphed, succeeded, and progressed as seen in the dismantling of Jim and Jane Crow segregation in the South, increased political representation at all levels of government, the passage of Civil Rights Act of 1964, and increased diverse representation of Black experiences in media, and much, much more!

Black people and supporting allies continually fight for justice against discrimination in all sectors of society from employment to education to housing.

Historically in the United States, it has often been Black individuals leading the charge to push the U.S. to live up to its ideals of freedom, liberty, and justice for all

A few (of Many) Moments Marking Women's Accomplishments in United States History

- **1848**: First women's rights convention organized by women held in New York
- **1917**: Jeannette Ranking (Montana) is sworn in as the first woman elected to Congress
- **1955**: Rosa Parks refuses to give up her seat--helps launch the civil rights movement
- **1972**: Title IX of the Education Amendments is signed into law
- **1981**: Sandra Day O'Connor sworn in as first woman to serve on the Supreme Court
- **2016**: Hillary Clinton becomes the first woman to receive presidential nomination

- **1869**: Wyoming passes America's first woman suffrage law, granting women the right to vote and hold office
- **1920**: The 19th Amendment is ratified declaring "the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex."
- **1963, 1964**: Equal Pay Act and Civil Rights Act are signed into law preventing workplace discrimination
- **1973**: Landmark 7-2 Roe v. Wade decision in the U.S. Supreme Court legalizing abortion
- 2007: Nancy Pelosi becomes the first female speaker of the House
- **2021**: Kamala Harris sworn in as first female Vice President of the U.S.
