


NATIONAL AMERICAN INDIAN HERITAGE MONTH

- Founder of the the Society of Indian Psychologists
- Founding member of the Boston Indian Council, one of the largest Indian centers in the country
- Well known for creating multiple culturally based programs and advancing family network therapy





- Heritage: Cahuilla-Cupeno from the Morongo Band of Mission Indians
- First American Indian from a California reservation to attend college
- First woman hired as a full professor at the University of Utah
- Founding member of the National Indian Education Association and Society for the Advancement of Chicanos and Native Americans in Science
