University Teaching Council Summer Teaching Development Grants

2019 Applications for the University Teaching Council's Summer Teaching Development Grants (STDG) are now being accepted through February 1, 2019. The purpose of the STDG program is to enhance student learning by engaging faculty to improve teaching methods, develop curricula, or create innovative course materials. Proposals should address the university, college, or departmental missions, including, but not limited to the LERS/Kent Core, distance learning, interdisciplinary courses, and experiential learning. Proposals must align with the mission of the University Teaching Council (UTC):

The Council shall support and facilitate the teaching mission of the University by studying and recommending policies to enrich and enhance teaching and curriculum development, recommending priorities for support of teaching and curriculum development, recommending faculty teaching development awards, collecting information on teaching and curriculum development, and publicizing teaching and curriculum development of the University.

All STDG grants must begin during Summer I. Faculty may submit an STDG proposal for a 5-week period (\$4,500) or a 10-week period (\$9,000). Additionally, collaborative proposals may split a \$9,000 award. Applicants are limited to one proposal.

The grant is open to all full-time faculty members from any Kent campus. Adjunct/part-time faculty members may apply as coapplicants with a full-time faculty member. Last year's recipients are not eligible to apply this year.

Kent State Stark Grant Activity Update

Grant Activity by Quarter, Fiscal Years 2018 – 2019

Table 1 displays grant submissions by quarter and outcomes and award rates for the corresponding quarterly grant submissions. The Stark Campus closed out fiscal year (FY) 2018 with 63 grant submissions valued at \$1.6 million, compared to 61 submissions in FY 2017 valued at \$5 million. In FY 2018, 40 grants were awarded in the amount of \$462,097. This is an increase of 29% in the number of grants awarded from FY 2017, although the average dollar value declined. The award rate for FY 2018 was 64% for the number of grants and 30% for the dollar value of grants. Through the first five months of FY 2019, 22 grants valued at \$469,859 have been submitted, and 13 have been awarded, valued at \$263,079 and the remaining 9 are pending.


